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Survey Method

In March 2001, the South Dakota Criminal Statistics Analysis Center (SAC) surveyed all Sheriff Offices in the State. A survey questionnaire accompanied by a cover letter was sent to all Sheriff Offices.

This was the ninth time the SAC compiled statewide management data pertaining to South Dakota Sheriff Offices. The results of this survey are intended to provide Sheriffs with a valid means of comparing policies and practices of offices across the State. In addition, the results should provide the Sheriffs with a substantial basis from which to justify future managerial decisions.

At the time of this survey, there are 65 sheriff offices in South Dakota. Fifty-three offices returned surveys yielding a total response rate of 82%.

The survey instrument is a self-report completed by the Sheriff or office staff. All questions were designed to be objective; however, some questions may have been subject to different interpretations. Thus, this report can only reflect summary results that are as valid and accurate as the data provided by each agency.

It should also be noted that salary data throughout this report are approximations. Due to the number of personnel at any given rank and the diverse salaries relative to each officer, such approximations were necessary in order to perform overall summary calculations.

General

The responding offices are arranged in ascending order by county population. This method of presentation allows the offices to make comparisons with other counties of similar size. FBI Report UCR52800 dated 6/18/01 furnished population figures. The counties are broken down by population as follows:

Eight Sheriff Offices are the only entity housed within their building while 45 Sheriff Offices are housed with other offices, agencies, etc.

Of the 45 offices that are housed with others, eleven Sheriff Offices share personnel with the other entities housed within their building; 33 do not share personnel; and one office did not respond.

When asked if their office shares equipment with other entities housed within their building; 35 Sheriff Offices said yes, nine do not share equipment, and one office did not respond.

Budget

The sheriffs were asked to specify the sources of income for their budget in 2001. The total income available to the responding agencies ranged from a low of \$42,000 per year to a high of \$4,056,136 per year. These county offices had a combined budget income of \$20,960,606 for 2001. The vast majority (89%), \$18,632,763, of this total figure came from county funds. Federal funds totaling

\$964,319 were received by eight offices. Ten offices also indicated that they obtained funds from “other” sources totaling \$1,166,297.

The sheriffs were also asked to provide a breakdown of their total office budget expenses by six specific categories. The following table illustrates the cumulative totals for each.

When personnel salaries and benefits were combined, they accounted for over three-fourths (76%) of the expenses incurred by sheriff offices throughout the State. Operating expenses accounted for 16% of the total budget, Capital Outlay 6%, Communications .4%, while 2% of the expenses went to an “Other” category.

Per Capita Cost of Law Enforcement

The 53 reporting sheriff offices serve counties ranging in size from 1,240 to 147,050 people (according to FBI Report UCR52800 dated 6/18/01). The combined total population of these jurisdictions is 657,214. By dividing the budget total expenses for all responding agencies, \$20,960,606, by the combined population of 657,214, a per capita cost of county law enforcement services of \$31.89 is obtained. This means the responding counties as a whole, currently spend over \$31 per person for county law enforcement. The per capita cost ranged from a low of \$27.53 for the population grouping of over 20,000 to a high of \$70.52 for the population range of 2,000-2,999.

Separating the counties into their population groupings, the budget breakdown and costs per capita can be further analyzed:

Officer Salaries

The Sheriff's salary schedule is set by SDCL 7-12-15. The statute states: "The salary payable to a sheriff shall be established by each board of county commissioners, by resolution, but may not be less than specified in the following schedule based upon the most recent decennial federal census of population of counties. The board of county commissioners may not decrease the salary of the sheriff during the term of office of the sheriff."

The Sheriffs were asked how the wages/salaries of the sworn officers (other than themselves) in their offices are determined. Thirty-four of the responding offices (64%) indicated the salaries were established at the discretion of county commissioners. Sixteen (30%) of the offices reported that a salary schedule or policy is in effect and three (6%) offices indicated "other".

Fifty-one percent (150) of the full-time, sworn county law enforcement officers in South Dakota are between the ages of 30 and 44 years. Of the 297 officers, 278 (94%) are male and 19 (6%) are female.

Education

After October 1, 1971, the Law Enforcement Standard and Training Commission required a high school diploma or the equivalent (GED) before any officer may be enrolled in the twelve week Basic Training Course, which is necessary for certification as a law enforcement officer. Individual offices may have further minimum requirements for education in order to achieve specific ranks within their particular agency.

Personnel Benefits

Education

Five of the 53 responding offices provide educational benefits for employees, 48 offices do not. Of the 48 offices that do not provide educational benefits, one is considering instituting a program that would provide benefits to its employees.

Insurance

South Dakota Sheriff Offices provide a wide variety of insurance plans for their officers and their families. Offices pay for these plans in full or in part, thereby reducing the financial burden on each officer.

Vacation

The survey results have delineated great variation among the offices in vacation allotments, sick leave, and the number of paid holidays offered officers. Below is a table showing the method of accumulation for vacation time and number of agencies that utilize each method:

Forty-six offices have a maximum number of vacation hours that may be earned; five offices have no maximum and two offices did not respond.

The maximum number of vacation hours that may be accumulated went from a low of 40 hours to a high of 320 hours. The average time that may be accumulated is 146.5 hours. Two accumulated totals had the greatest response of eight offices each (15%); they were 120 hours and 240 hours. Vacation hours may be accumulated before the probationary period is completed in 37 of the offices (70%).

Sick Leave

Forty-six offices have a sick leave policy, five offices have no sick leave policy and two offices did not respond. Employees can earn from 42 hours up to 144 hours of sick leave per year according to those surveyed. The majority of offices (45% or 24 offices) can earn up to 96 hours per year.

When asked if there are a maximum number of sick leave hours which may be accrued from year to year, 28 offices (53%) responded yes; 17 offices (32%) had no maximum; one office (2%) did not allow accrual of sick time; and seven offices (13%) did not respond.

Of the 28 offices that responded “yes” when asked if there was a maximum number of sick leave hours that can be accrued, seven offices reported that 480 hours is the maximum that can be accrued. The range of hours that may be accrued varied from a low of 96 hours to a high of 960 hours.

Twenty-eight offices do pay for a portion of unused sick time when employees retire. The amount that is paid varied from 100-960 hours to 25%-50% of the sick leave balance.

Six offices (11%) responded that they do get paid for unused sick time each year; 40 offices (75%) said no; and seven offices (13%) did not respond.

Paid overtime is received by 45% of line officers and by 17% of supervisory officers.

Twenty-four of the responding offices that receive paid overtime indicated the rate of time and one-half, three offices receive straight time, and one office indicated "other" as their rate of compensation.

Second Job

Forty-six offices (87%) permit their officers to work a second job, seven offices (13%) do not. The following table demonstrates the limitations, if any, placed on sworn officers who routinely work second jobs (an office may list more than one type of limitation):

Twenty-two offices (42%) do not plan on upgrading their radio system while 31 offices (58%) do plan to upgrade. Three offices plan to upgrade this year; eight offices plan to upgrade in 2002; five offices in 2003 and six offices do not know when they will upgrade. One agency has three mobile data terminals; 52 agencies do not.

Forty offices (75%) are affiliated with a 911 PSAP (Public Safety Answering Post). Thirty offices (57%) dispatch for other entities, i.e. fire, ambulance, etc.

Contract Law Enforcement

A section of the survey was devoted to sheriff offices providing law enforcement services to municipalities in their jurisdictions. Twenty-three (43%) of the responding offices have a contract to provide law enforcement services to at least one of the municipalities in their county. Seven sheriffs, including Aurora County, Beadle County, Campbell County, Davison County, Marshall County, Perkins County, and Ziebach County, indicated that their offices provide contract law enforcement services for all of the incorporated areas within their jurisdictions.

Six offices are paid based on an hourly rate with a range of \$10 to \$35. Nine offices are paid based on an annual rate with a range of \$6,000 to \$164,000. Four offices are paid based on a per capita rate with a range of \$42 to \$88.40. One office reported being paid by the percentage of hours contracted and one office by population, tax valuation, and proximity.

All of the 23 offices provide year-round contract services. The number of hours per month spent by these offices providing services to municipalities range from 25 hours to 1,274 hours. The average is 286 hours per month.

Eight offices (15%) have a contract to provide law enforcement services for federal agencies. Seven of these patrol federally owned property and one does jail administration. Three of the offices provide this service year round and five offices provide it seasonally. The hours per month for year round law enforcement services range from 120 to 1,906 hours. The average reported hours are 625 hours per month.

Cities Not Under Contract

Forty-seven offices report that a collective total of 182 cities of less than 1,000 population are not under contract with the sheriff's office. Of those cities not under contract with the sheriff's office, the police department in 15 cities provides law enforcement protection; federal law enforcement provides protection for one city; and 27 cities protection is on-call. Three cities indicated that the sheriff's office provides protection and one city reported that the mayor provides law enforcement protection.

Warrants

Forty-six offices served 32,061 warrants and received 33,800 warrants; four offices did not have records on how many warrants were served and received.

Forty-one offices served 2,045 out-of-county warrants and received 2,590 out-of-county warrants. Nineteen offices spent a total of \$77,444 in extradition costs averaging \$4,076 per office.

Many offices have dedicated full-time and part-time positions to the processing of warrants. Of the responding offices, 45 offices have 120 full-time officers and five offices have 18 part-time officers. Thirteen offices have 20 full-time civilians and six offices have six part-time civilians.

Civil Process

Fifty-three sheriff offices served a combined total of 47,418 civil papers in 2000. Fifty offices collected \$441,946 in civil fees that were turned over to the County Treasurers. Forty-three offices collected \$65,149 for mileage fees that were related to the civil process.

Fifty offices returned 3,397 executions in 2000, at a total dollar value of \$1,308,830. It should be noted that two counties (Pennington and Codrington) have constables to aid in the civil process. Some counties do not record their civil process activities. Therefore, the statistics presented here should not be viewed as comprehensive totals for statewide civil process procedures. These totals are lower than the actual statewide totals would be.

Most of the sheriff offices keep track of the degree of satisfaction for executions served based on the amount of fees returned to the County Treasurer. Of the 3,397 executions reported, 3,017 were listed under the degree of satisfaction. Of the 3,017 listed under the degree of satisfaction, 643 (21%) executions were returned fully satisfied; 446 (15%) were returned partially satisfied; and 1,928 (64%) were returned unsatisfied. Three offices were not able to provide a breakdown of executions, which totaled 380. The degree of satisfaction should not be seen as a reflection on the quality of work done by the specific sheriff offices. Many factors are involved in whether an execution is satisfied or not, and these factors will vary among jurisdictions. Such factors include executions that receive no action because they are in aid of garnishment and executions that still may be pending.

Twenty-eight offices reported collecting a total of \$219,584 in delinquent taxes. Property taxes collected for the local county total \$162,316. Sales and unemployment taxes collected for the state totaled \$57,268.

Reserve Officers

Twelve sheriff offices (Clay, Deuel, Douglas, Gregory, Harding, Hughes, Lyman, Meade, Minnehaha, Pennington, Spink, and Ziebach) report having a total of 90 reserve officers. Eighty-two (91%) of the reserve officers are male and eight (9%) are female. The average number of hours each reserve officer volunteers in a month is 13 hours. The range of hours went from a low of four hours per month to a high of twenty-two hours a month.

Seven (58%) of the 12 sheriff offices have an office policy that allows reserve officers to patrol on their own when the officers have met the state criteria allowing them to patrol alone.

Understanding that reserve officers may be paid under special circumstances, nine (75%) of the 12 sheriff offices paid the officers in the Year 2000.

Three (25%) sheriff offices do provide the reserve officers a weapon.

Police Dogs (K-9)

Three sheriff offices each reported owning one police dog. One office is planning on purchasing a dog within the next two years. All three offices report that the dog is primarily used for drug detection work. One office reported its dog is also used as a patrol dog. One dog has been used for search and rescue.

Crime Reporting (UCR/NIBRS)

Over half (68%) of the responding sheriff offices are currently participating in reporting crime statistics to the DCI/SAC Unit. Of the 36 reporting offices, 22 (61%) report NIBRS (National Incident Based Reporting System) short form; six (17%) report NIBRS long form; and eight (22%) report UCR (Uniform Crime Reporting). Four offices indicated that they would be interested in reporting.

Of the offices currently not involved in reporting crime statistics, eight offices have an alternate system to tally the major offenses that occur in their jurisdiction; eight offices do not; and one did not respond. Six offices keep this information in an automated database.

Computers

The following table breaks down the 362 computers collectively owned by the 53 responding sheriff offices. Fifty-one (96%) offices own a computer, two (4%) offices do not:

Forty (78%) of the 51 offices that own a computer do have internet access.

Turnover

Thirty-seven (70%) offices had no full-time officers leave their office during 2000. Fifteen offices had a total of 26 officers resign; two offices had a total of five officers retire; and one office had one officer dismissed.

The one dismissed officer had two years with the sheriff office and two years law enforcement experience.

County Jails

Twenty-five (47%) of the counties responding to the survey operate a jail facility. Thirteen (52%) of the facilities are classified as Regional Jail Centers; that is, they house prisoners from other jurisdictions as well as from their own. Another seven (28%) have Full Jail Facilities and are able to house their own prisoners for extended periods of time (longer than 72 hours). Five counties (20%) have Limited Holding Facilities which are limited to housing prisoners for less than 72

hours. After 72 hours of being incarcerated, the prisoners in the Limited Holding Facilities must be transported to a Regional Jail Center in a neighboring jurisdiction.

Thirty-one (58%) counties have a formal contract with another jurisdiction to house prisoners. There were a total of 2,081 prisoners that were housed in another county's jail facility. The number of prisoners taken to another county's jail facility ranged from five prisoners in one county to 680 prisoners in another county. The responding counties traveled a total of approximately 162,070 miles transporting prisoners. The jail fee paid for each prisoner per day ranged from \$28 to \$50. The majority of the counties (14 counties) paid \$50 per prisoner per day. The total dollar amount spent by the responding offices in 2000 for jail fees to other jurisdictions totaled \$865,217.

Of the 25 counties that have a jail facility, 10 (40%) of them have a contract with the U.S. Marshal's Office to board federal prisoners.

Jail Budget

Twenty-four offices reported a combined jail budget total of \$14,869,756 (Jones County Sheriff's Office did not report a budget). The jail budgets are further analyzed for each county in detailed tables by population groupings located in the back of this publication. The combined jail budget by category for reporting offices is as follows:

The authorized salary range (low to high) for the correctional officers is \$14,872 to \$38,230.

Jail Personnel

The responding 25 counties report a total of 388 employees involved in the operation of the jail facilities. Over three-fourths (332 or 83%) are full-time employees, with 17% (82) working part-time. The jail personnel are involved in direct custody functions, clerical/maintenance activities, and/or the administration of the facilities. Seventy-six percent of the employees are involved in direct custody functions, with titles such as correctional officer, guard, jailer, etc.

It should be noted that the meaning of the term “jail personnel” will vary among offices. Of the 25 responding offices, 12 counties report that jail personnel have varied responsibilities within the offices; such as deputies, dispatchers, and secretaries in combination with their duties as correctional officers. These split responsibilities should be noted when examining the detailed tables in the back of this section for the specific offices.

Collectively, the number of correctional officers that have shared duties breaks down as follows:

- 37 Correctional Officers/Dispatchers
- 24 Correctional Officers/Deputies
- 23 Correctional Officers/Other Combinations
- 22 Correctional Officers/Secretaries

Twenty-three offices report that their correctional officers receive formal training. Eighteen offices receive in-service training; 14 offices receive training at D.C.I. Training Academy; five receive National Sheriffs’ Association Jail Training Correspondence and three offices indicate “other” for their training. Many offices receive more than one type of formal training.

Holding Capacity

Responding agencies report that the daily jail fee charged to other jurisdictions for boarding prisoners averages \$47 per day. The range was \$40 to \$60. The collective total amount of jail fees received from other jurisdictions in 2000 was \$3,171,529 as reported by 22 agencies. The total amount of county work release monies collected was \$1,152,840.

County jails often serve a dual function as detention facilities for the unconvicted and as confinement facilities for persons convicted of offenses. The following table analyzes this information collectively:

The average age of a jail facility is 38 years. The range was from 1 ½ years old to 93 years old.

The remaining information collected for the jails is presented in tables following the “Jail Definitions”. The counties are arranged alphabetically within the following categories: 1) Regional Jail Centers; 2) Full Jail Facilities; 3) Limited Jail Facilities; and 4) No Jail Facilities. Definitions are provided for clarification:

Jail Definitions

Regional Jail Center – jail facility which houses prisoners from at least one other jurisdiction in addition to the county’s own prisoners.

Full Jail Facility – able to house county’s own prisoners for extended periods of time (longer than 72 hours).

Limited Holding Facility – limited to holding prisoners for less than 72 hours. Any prisoner who must be incarcerated for more than 72 hours must be transported from a limited holding facility to a regional jail center.

Total Jail Personnel – includes both full and part-time employees involved in jail operations. May include personnel with other responsibilities in the office.

Receive Prisoners From – the counties a regional jail center will receive prisoners from.

Total Prisoner Days – the sum total of days that each prisoner spent in jail. For example, three prisoners for four days equals 12 prisoner days.

Out-Of-County Prisoner Days – number of prisoner days when inmates were held for other jurisdictions, such as neighboring counties and federal agencies.

Daily Fee Charged – price charged per day to other jurisdictions for boarding their prisoners.

Prisoners Received – number of prisoners received by the facility in the year 2000.

Prisoners Taken To – jurisdiction where counties with a limited holding facility or no jail facility take their prisoners.

Total Prisoners Transported – number of prisoners the county had to transport to another jail facility in the year 2000.

Mileage Transporting Prisoners – number of miles traveled by the office transporting prisoners to another facility in the year 2000.

Daily Fee Paid – price paid per day to another jurisdiction for boarding of prisoners.

Total Jail Fees Paid – total dollar amount spent by the office in the year 2000 in jail fees to other jurisdictions.

Total Jail Fees Received – total dollar amount received by regional jail centers from other counties for boarding their prisoners.

Work Release Monies Received – dollar amount of county work release monies collected by the office in the year 2000.

When reviewing the jail budget data, it is important to realize that some offices have completely distinct budgets for their jails separate from their office budget. Other counties cannot separate jail costs from their total budget. In these counties, it is difficult to distinguish the expenses incurred for jail personnel from the office personnel costs, and the jail operations expenses from the office expenses, etc. Budget comparisons among these counties are difficult.

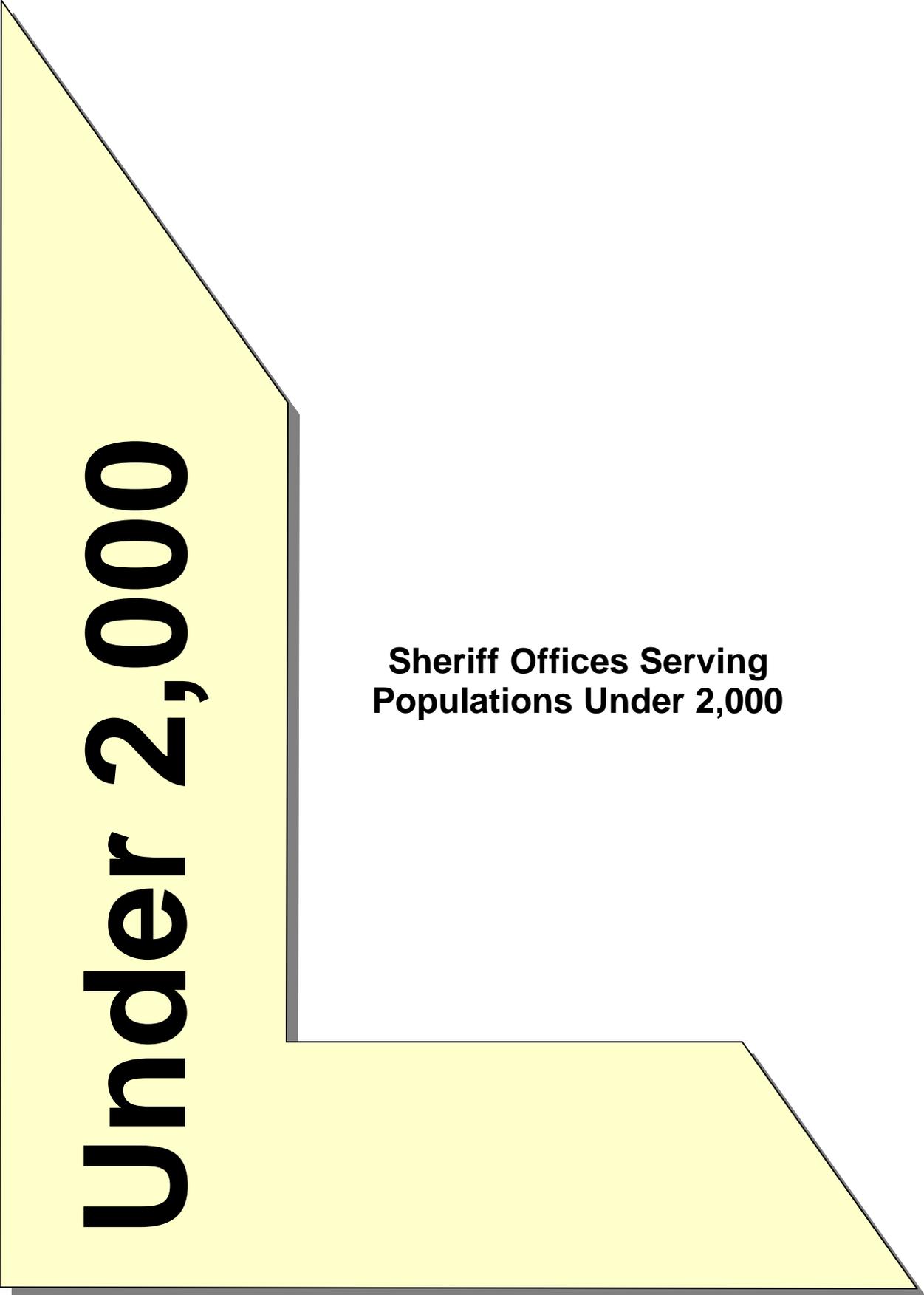

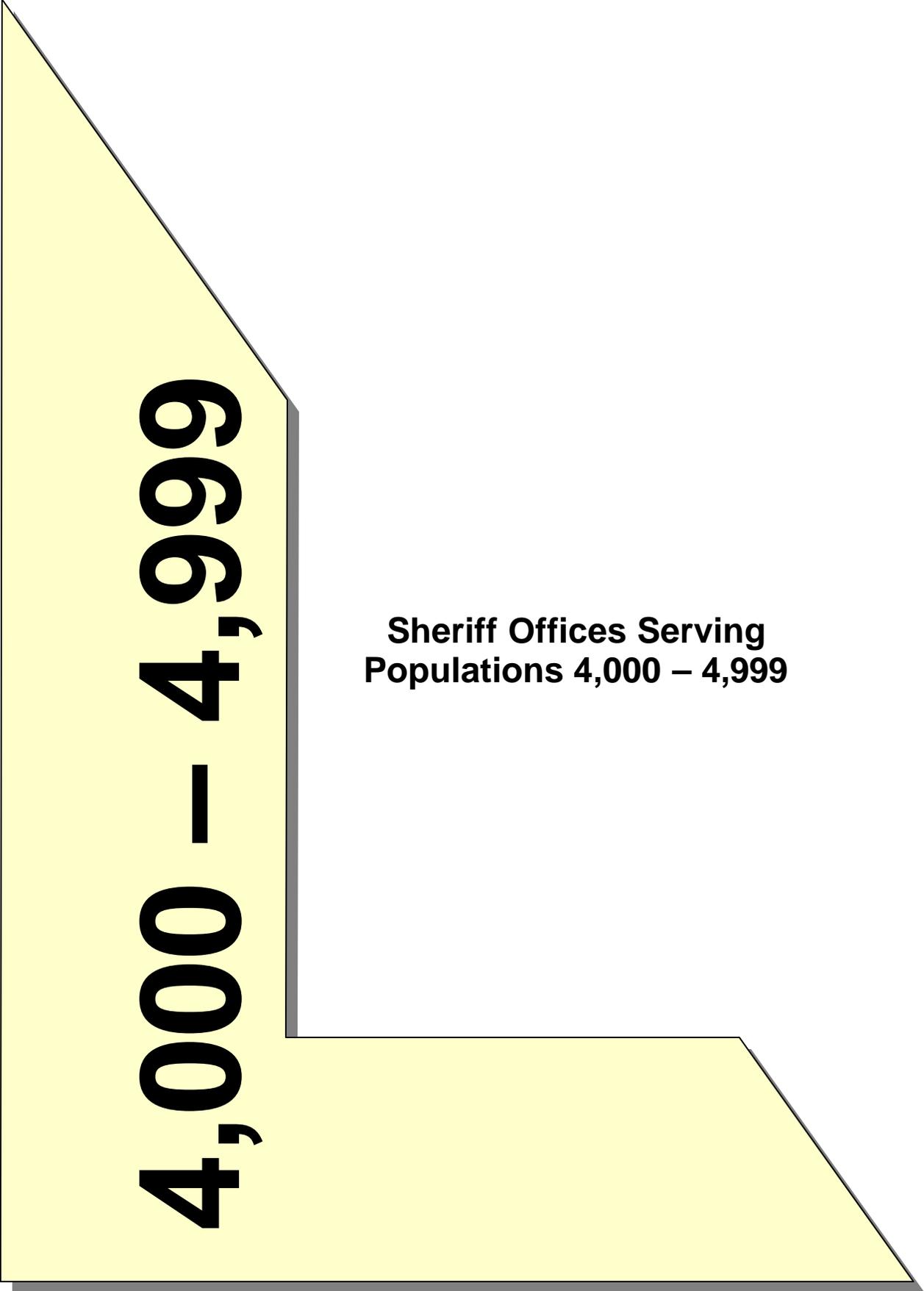

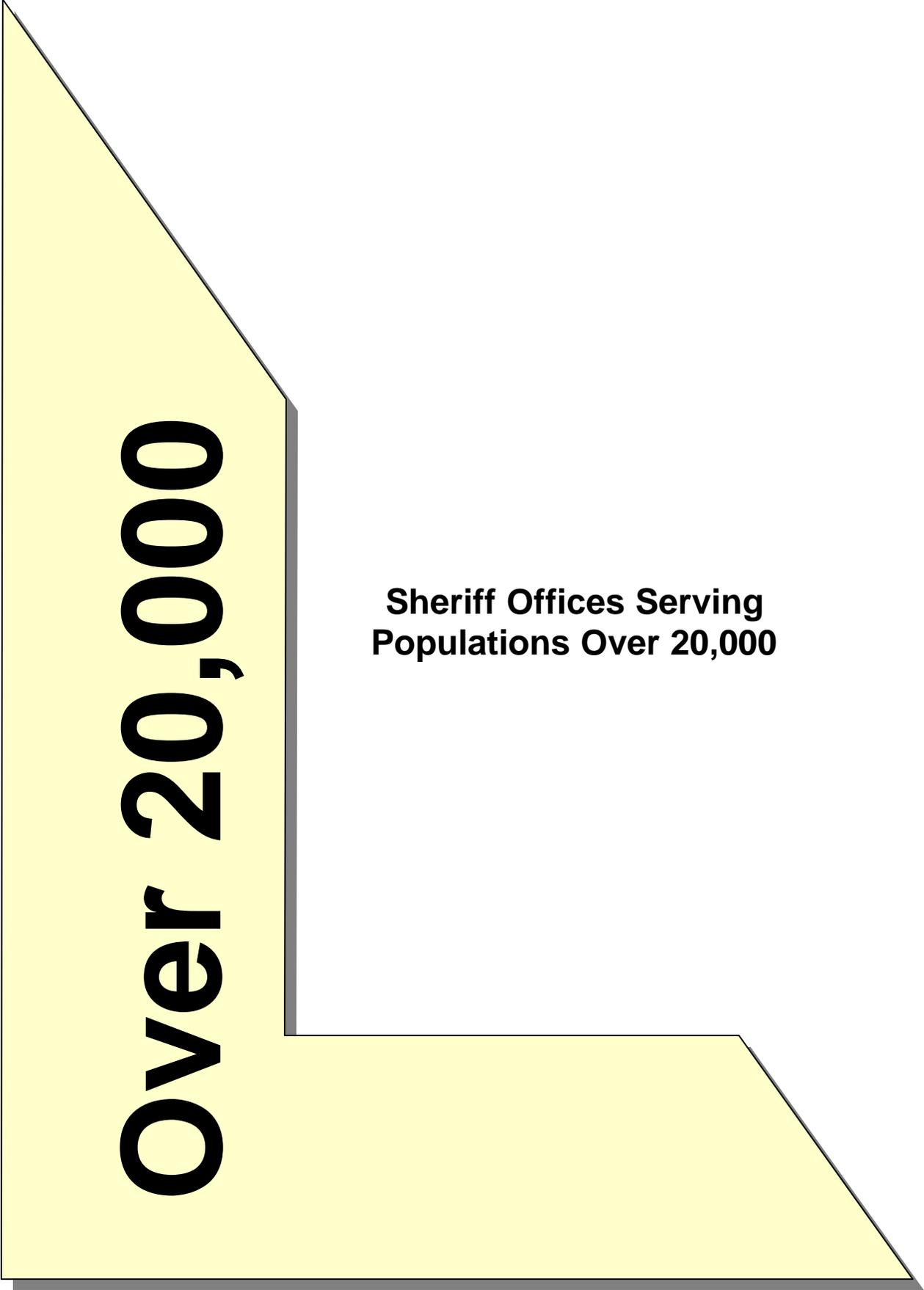
